

Ingrid Kirkeberg 1862 to 1960

In the 1840's Anders and Ingrid Kirkeberg came to America, staying in Buffalo, NY, long enough for Anders to learn more about stone cutting and masonry, his trade in Norway. They moved to Rock Prairie, WI, where he built many buildings. From there they moved to a farm near Gunder, lowa. Sara was born in Clayton County, IA on July 10, 1862. Sara attended school in a little red schoolhouse built by her father. Her teacher considered drawing and painting a waste of time and she got into trouble for sketching in class. Other teachers encouraged her talent and urged her parents to have her take lessons someday. When Sara was 20, she stayed with her brother Gunder in Cummings, ND, where she worked



with clay. She was encouraged to go to Minneapolis to study art. She moved to Minneapolis in the late I1880's, took art classes and went to New York to learn to mix paints. She started painting altar paintings in 1889-1890. One of her first paintings is in Lyster Lutheran Church, Nelson, WI. Another painting that was done before her marriage is at Swan Lake Lutheran near New Ulm, MN. She married Carl Raugland in 1891. They had two children. She lived in Minneapolis and was a member of Bethlehem Lutheran Church. They have one of her paintings in the church. Sara was one of few women altar painting artists of the time. It was unusual for a woman to have her own listing in the city directory and maintain a studio outside her home. She advertised in the Norwegian Lutheran magazine and had advertising postcards. She published catalogs in 1893 and 1899. These were in Norwegian and show some of the paintings and the churches who purchased her paintings. They also included testimonials by various pastors or members of the church. The prices of her paintings varied. I have discovered \$50-\$100 as the most common pricing range. The paintings also varied in size to fit the altars and needs of the congregation, some as small as 2'x 4' to 5' x 9-1/2'. Many of her paintings were purchased

by the Ladies Aid groups or youth groups at the churches. Some of the churches have receipts and records of the purchase. She signed her paintings several different ways. She used Sara and Sarah, sometimes with her maiden and married names. One with Mrs., several with the initial S. I have tried to catalog the various signatures as I travel to view each work. Sara is reported to have painted over 200 altar paintings before closing her studio on the death of her husband in 1918. She moved to her daughter's home and continued doing small paintings, crocheting and making piece quilts. Sara was active until her death on December 6, 1960, at the age of 98. Sara was my great-great aunt. I am very proud to be keeping records of her work.

Following are some notes about my research. I was aware of Sarah's paintings from my mother and some cousins who visited some of the churches in Iowa with her paintings. In 2007, I discovered the church my husband Peter and I were attending had one of Sara's paintings. The day after this discovery, the church was vandalized, and the painting slashed and badly damaged. The vandalism was reported in the Rochester, MN newspaper and my connection to the painting was reported. I started receiving calls and letters telling me of other churches with her paintings. (The painting has been restored and returned to the altar.) This started me on the journey of finding how many of her paintings were still in churches. Using her catalog and some information from other sources, I have located 114 of her paintings as of August 2022. I am very fortunate to have a husband who is also interested in the older churches and her paintings. We enjoy the history of the old church congregations as much as finding the paintings. The struggles to build and equip these early churches is wonderful reading. The churches are mostly Norwegian in ancestry since Sara's catalog and early advertising were in Norwegian. We have traveled the Midwest (MN, IA, WI, ND, SD, MI, IL) and to Washington and Oregon to view paintings. She also has one in the Valdres area of Norway which we have visited. Some of the paintings have found me through some of the contacts made over the years. We have met some wonderful people over the years. The pictures and text on the pages I create of each church are mostly mine, I have tried to note when I use someone else's photos. I have discovered taking pictures of altar paintings can be challenging with the glare, lighting and beautiful stained-glass windows.
