PRESIDENTIAL STATE OF THE HILL ADDRESS:

Greetings from Heritage Hill. With autumn coming to a close, it appears another year of crop production is about completed. When traveling the rural areas a handful of corn fields can be found that need to be harvested, but those fields are few and far between. The fall tillage is not far behind and most likely will be completed in a week or two. The 2015 crop production season is one for the history books. I have been close to farming all my life and this season has to be the best that I can remember. The rain falls were perfect, never too much to cause flood damage, and precipitation fell whenever there was a hint it was getting a little dry. In addition the heat units were ample, but never too hot to cause stress to the vegetation. Reportedly, area corn yields exceeded 200 bushels per acre and soybeans yielded between 55 and 60 bushels per acre, some fields doing a little better. In early and middle October Heritage Hill members gathered at the hill to harvest the corn raised on the county land. The corn crib was refilled with about 1,000 bushels of cobbed corn, and other 4,600 bushels where harvested, hauled and sold at the elevator. At the end of the day the county land yielded about 132 bushels to the acre. Unfortunately, there are about 13 acres of the county land that yielded no crop due to inadequate drainage. Despite the timely rains this area did flood again in 2015. Heritage Hill is again very grateful to Chippewa County for the continued use of the land. The crop produced continues to be an important fundraiser for Heritage Hill.

Thanks is extended to Sally Philips who volunteered and coordinated the 2015 nominating committee, who spent a considerable amount of time contacting Heritage Hill members, sparking their interest as possible 2016 board of director members. Thanks are also extended to all Heritage Hill members who agreed to run for various officer and director positions. The annual election was held October 20. At the end of the evening the following members were elected and will be serving on the board in 2016: Gerald Kleene, President; Orlynn Hegna, Vice President; Monica Engen, Secretary; Leslie Bergquist, Treasurer; Kyle Ashling, Stephen Coon, Chip Grube, Dustin Johnson and Ron Molde, Directors. Special thanks go out to Marlys Heath, Floyd Kanten, Mick Sellman, James Roe and the late LuVerne Bangsund for their longtime dedication to the board of directors. I would like to thank the membership for your past support, commitment and volunteerism, while I served as President 10 out of the past 11 years. It has been a very educational and interesting experience, one which I will always cherish. It has been an honor to serve such a great organization. Looking forward, I will not be going away as I will continue to serve on the board as the past president.

I always find the origin of words fascinating. Currently there are 1,025,109 words in the English language, and the origin of most words we too often take for granted. Most of us learned the English language and its related words by listening to others in our infant years, with no concern for the origin or words. For me I first learned Norwegian so speaking English has been a challenge most of my life. Over the years, while interested in farm machinery, I have read many accounts as to the origin of the word "tractor". The most common version goes back to an individual W.H. Williams who in 1906 was writing advertising for Hart-Parr Company. He was struggling with the cumbersome term "gasoline traction engine", when the word "tractor" flashed into his mind. It was a word that combined "traction" and "motor". Soon the newly coined term tractor becomes part of every equipment dealer and farmer's



vocabulary. The term is still alive and well with modern day tractors currently rolling off assembly lines. What I did not know until recently is that there may be another source of the word "tractor". There is strong evidence the real origin came from the Latin word "trahere", which means "to pull or draw". Just thought that would be another interesting tractor collecting fun fact to pass along.

With Veteran's Day upon us, this is a good time to recognize all United States Veterans and continue to extend thanks. Your service and sacrifices made this country the greatest nation in the world. Most World War II Veterans are now 90+ years old and are disappearing fast. According to the National World War II Museum in New Orleans, approximately 855,000 out of 16,000,000 US veterans remain alive today. In Minnesota there are only about 15,000 remaining WWII veterans. Currently, throughout the United States, 492 WWII Veterans die each day. It is estimated by the year 2036, the last surviving WWII will be deceased. If ever looking for a travel destination, the National WWII Museum tells the story of the American Experience in the war that changed the world why it was fought, how it was won, and what it means today - so that all generations will understand the price of freedom and be inspired by what they learn. On October Karen & I traveled to the Lake Region Pioneer Farmers show site near Lake Itasca to attend the fall MAAPS meeting. After the meeting we were treated to a tour of their show grounds.
